Emil Frankel was appointed Assistant Secretary for Transportation Policy of the United States Department of Transportation in March of 2002. From 1991 to 1995, he served as Commissioner of the Connecticut Department of Transportation. In this capacity he was responsible for an annual budget of over \$1 billion and for the construction, rehabilitation, maintenance, and management of a multi-modal transportation system, including Connecticut's state system of highways and bridges, bus and commuter rail services, and airports. He was Chairman of the Standing Committee on the Environment of the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials (AASHTO) and Vice Chairman of the I-95 Corridor Coalition. He has served as a speaker, panelist, and moderator on a wide range of transportation topics including Intelligent Transportation Systems (ITS) technologies, intercity rail services, transportation planning and management, and transportation and air quality. He is a graduate of Wesleyan University, where he served as a Trustee from 1981 to 1997. Mr. Frankel was a Fulbright Scholar at Manchester University in the United Kingdom and received his law degree from Harvard Law School.
